RIDGEWAY SCHOLARSHIP

I am delighted to announce that Joel Beardmore has been selected as The Ridgeway Scholar for 2017-18.

The Scholarship offers an opportunity for a student who is normally resident in Lincolnshire or Huntingdonshire (before the boundary changes of 1974) to study for an academic year at the University of Evansville in the USA.

The scholarship is usually most attractive to those students completing their last year of secondary education and looking for a 'gap year' opportunity to study and travel in the USA. The Scholarship pays international air fare, all tuition costs, and room and board accommodation for a year of study at the University of Evansville in Indiana. The grant offsets education costs of more than \$45,000.

GEOGRAPHY

Year 12 Geography students went on a trip to Hull earlier this month and wrote the following account:

The purpose of the visit was to investigate whether Hull deserved the title of Britain's worst city, or had the recent regeneration been successful in transforming this former docking area. Hull was chosen for the trip due to the range of regeneration strategies taking place there. The fact that it is the Capital of Culture for 2017 means that its rebranding is taking place alongside the physical regeneration projects.

Armed with the hypothesis "Urban regeneration in Hull has been successful", we set out from the St Stephen's Shopping Centre and visited 5 areas within the city centre itself, collecting data in each place. As we moved through the different areas it became apparent that the physical urban-scape was changing. Despite the obvious physical changes seen we spoke with locals who remembered a time when industry dominated and Hull was a successful city and many took pleasure in recounting exactly what they thought was wrong with the modern day Hull.

The data collected on the trip will be written up and will help to answer the hypothesis. The trip also gave the us a different perception of Hull to that originally held and a large number of the us look forward to going back in the summer to complete our independent investigation.

The following account of the Year 10 Geography Fieldtrip was written by Michael Cowell.

"Ah, Geography ... is it not the best of all subjects? The only correct answer to this, of course, is yes. Did you answer no to this? That answer is wrong. What other subject allows for two field trips in one Year? In the opinions of many, this trip really goes to show that data is not only useful, but it can also be enjoyable to collect.

The River Witham Geography trip was a success, with lots of data collected. Whilst it would be easier to use pre-gathered data, it is much more reliable (and less tedious) to go out in the field and collect it yourself, and that is just what we did. A clinometer, tape measure, couple of metre rules, some ambitious minds, a mini-van and some wellies were all we needed as we set off. After a quick journey to South Witham, we donned our boots, hopped out of the van, rolled up our sleeves and threw some dog biscuits into the river. Don't worry, this was not some peculiar case of organised littering, this was the magic of geography in action!

To provide more detail, two people were stationed at two poles ten metres apart (one upstream, one downstream). The person upstream would place a dog biscuit on the surface of the water, making sure not to stand in the way of the current, telling the person by the bank to start the stopwatch. When the dog biscuit reached the downstream pole, the timing would be stopped. This process was repeated three times for the left, right and centre of the river. This was done to measure the velocity of the water. The use of the dog biscuits may seem odd, but their usefulness is great—they float just beneath the surface of the water so they are not slowed down by friction from the air, they are very light and they are cost effective.

We measured the area of the river crosssection. We did this by measuring the width of the river and then the depth at each tenth of the distance. This method is used as the information it provides in drawing of the river



cross-section can be created to a reasonable degree of accuracy enabling the area to be measured with ease.

Next we needed the velocity and surface area of different points of the river in order to calculate the discharge (the amount of water that passes a certain point in a certain amount of time). Although most antiflood agencies use water level as an indicator for impending danger, discharge can also be utilized effectively for this purpose. In addition, an idea of the amount of water passing through points in a river is invaluable for the further study of said river, which presents itself to us as the main motivation for the outing.

Unrelated to the discharge, the valley profile also required measurement. A river naturally forms a valley through means of weathering, and the different valley profiles can be indicative of how far from the source a point in the river is. We collected this information to see if

there was any correlation between distance downstream and valley type. Our hypothesis was that there would be a link—the further downstream, the more "u" shaped the valley would be, as opposed to a "v" shape. We measured the angle of incline of the valley using a clinometer and several ranging poles to mark a distance of 10 metres.

This data will prove to be very useful in our upcoming GCSEs where fieldwork skills count for a large section of the total GCSE level. Trips like these are hugely important to the course as a whole, and as they are usually very successful, many hope that King's will continue these for a long time to come."

MUSIC

Grantham Music Festival

The Percussion Ensemble performed with great success at the Grantham Music Festival and came away with the Miss Roberta Lynn Trophy for instrumental groups of less than 12 players. This trophy is awarded to the group with the highest mark over two classes that were performed during the percussion category.

Music for Youth Festival

The Big Band, Percussion Ensemble and Winners of the Year 9 Battle of the Bands performed in the regional round of the National Festival of Music for Youth in Boston. All three groups produced outstanding performances, after which the



judges provided very positive feedback. They were very impressed with the quality of music being generated by just one school. We

now have to wait and see if any of the groups were successful in gaining the opportunity to perform at the National Finals to take place in Birmingham in July.



Year 7 Mash Up Project

All Year 7 students performed in an evening of music in the School Hall. In order to develop their performance experience, students have been learning to play either the trumpet, trombone or saxophone in lessons.

The concert offered an opportunity to see some of the performance skills they have been developing. It gave the students real experience of being a musician and playing in a concert. There were also performances from the Senior Soul Band, allowing the younger students to see what they could aspire to. During the day each class had a 40 minute workshop on either djembe's or Samba drums run by Tim Brain, with performances from these also being included in the concert.

Spring Concert

During the evening of the Spring Concert, the Concert Band, Wind Band, String Ensemble, Percussion Ensemble, Brass Ensemble and Choir performed. There were also solo performances by Year 13 students Matt Walton and Chris Standen as well as a performance of Chasing Cars by Luke Lewis of Year 9. There were some fantastic performances that were enjoyed by the audience and enabled the boys to showcase their musical talents.

Jazz Nite

Jazz Nite was a complete sell-out, and in record time this year. It featured the Big Band, Knotso's, Senior and Junior Soul Bands, Year 9 Battle of the Bands Winners, Soloists and many excellent student-led en-

sembles. The music ranged from 1920s music to Rag n Bone Man and Snarky Puppy, hopefully introducing new music to the audience. There were also performances from the KGGS Soul Band and Grantham



Music Centre Big Band. During the 3 hours, half of the music was performed by student-led groups, organised and rehearsed by themselves, with many of them arranging their own music. These groups are a true testament to the talent and ambitious nature of the students within the Music Department.
