INVESTOR CHALLENGE SEMI-FINALISTS

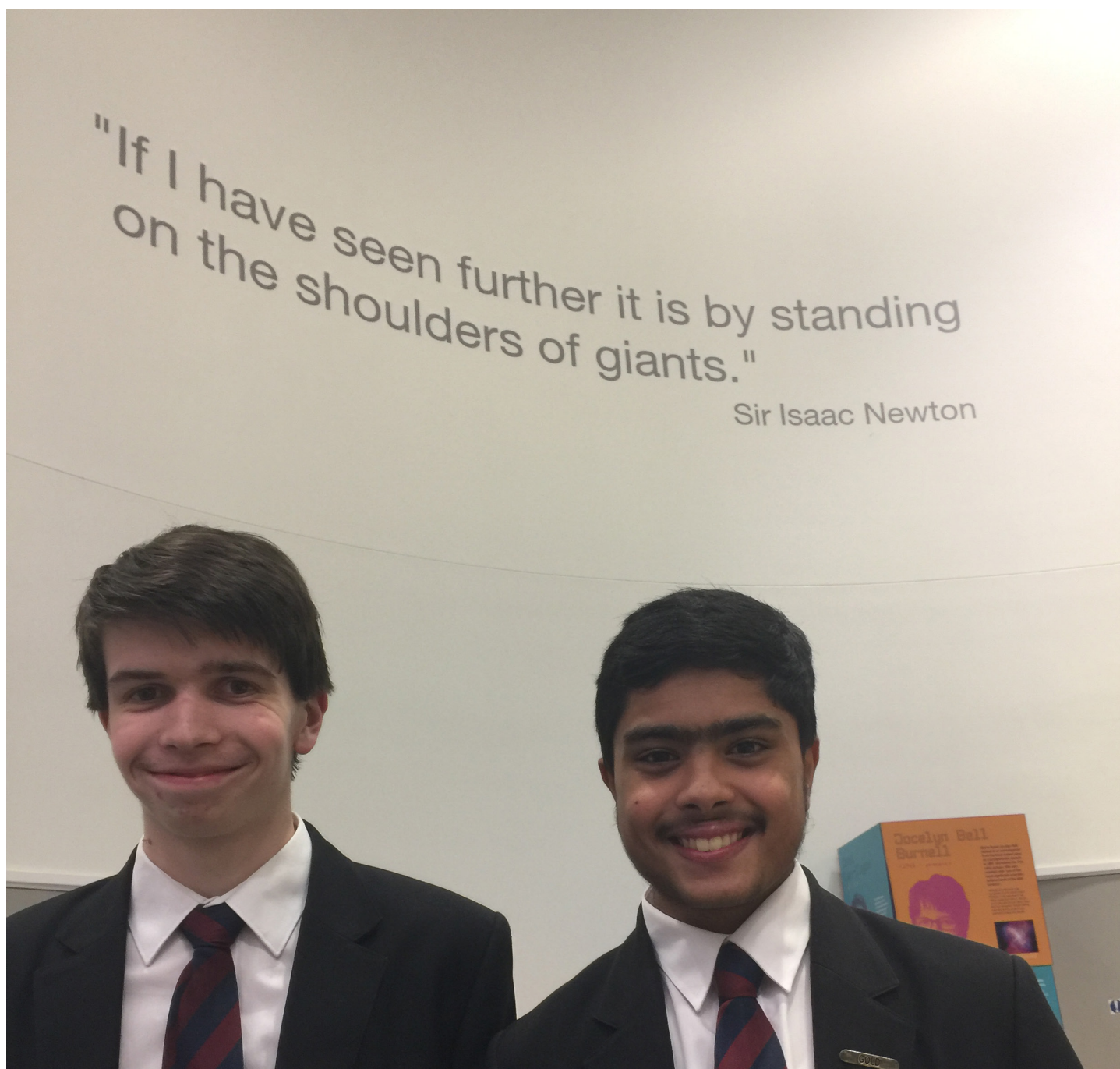

Our group finished in the top 500 teams in the United Kingdom, we are now aiming to qualify for a place in the final after achieving 161 position out of a possible 5,885 teams nationally.

Our approach to reaching this position was comprised of a little fortune, a lot of strategy and an Excel spreadsheet which we created so as to maximise our best investments.

However, we did have our problems, and due to a miscalculation in our spreadsheet, we ended up losing £5,000 on a single investment. We managed to re-coup this loss just in time through a 'gut-instinct' investment - without consulting our spreadsheet! Fortunately it made a profit!

The team reached this stage by defeating St George's Academy, Carres Grammar School, De Aston School, Brunts Academy and Harrogate Grammar School. The highlight of the campaign was undoubtedly the round of the last 16 tie away to Harrogate. Harrogate created the quintessential cup atmosphere by having the game kick off during their lunchtime, meaning that a crowd of several hundred turned up to watch a top quality display of youth rugby. The intimidating atmosphere created by the vocal crowd did not seem to affect the King's boys, who produced some excellent rugby to secure a 36-12 victory.

The excitement continued later in the week as the team gathered together at lunchtime to watch the draw for the quarter final live on the RFU Schools' Twitter page. A victory against the Samuel Whitbread Academy would have meant a semi-final tie at Allianz Park, home of English Premiership side Saracens. However, it was not to be with the boys battling bravely, but ultimately losing, their quarter final match. Each player should be proud of their achievements in reaching this stage of the competition and look to build on this when they reach the U18 age group and have another go at the same competition.

BEING IN THE CCF BY F/SGT AARON TREVOR AND IC RAF SECTION

The CCF here at King's is one of the largest extra-curricular organisations within school. The organisation comes down to Lt Col Ogg, Csgt Pulfrey and the team of officers and staff who put their all into making sure that all of the cadets here get everything that they possibly can and that it is embraced by all of us to the full extent that it can be.

The range of opportunities offered varies from Leadership courses at RAF College Cranwell, home of Initial Officer training, to competition finals at RAF Halton, home of basic recruit training.

My aim is to give an insight into why I joined the CCF, how I have developed in my time in CCF and the different opportunities that I have taken during the past four and a half years as a cadet and more recently as a senior NCO and IC RAF Section.

I joined the CCF as an over-excitable Year 8 with few future aspirations. I joined as a way of being involved with the school's extra-curricular life but soon realised that the CCF is more than another extra-curricular activity. The camaraderie is unmatched, with the Army and RAF Sections working side by side. Since then I have developed in many areas including: confidence, personal standards, discipline, leadership, and followership. Perhaps some of the most valuable skills in life that one could hope to have.

Many of the activities take place outside of school time but are worth the commitment. A highlight of the RAF Section calendar is the Royal Air Squadron Trophy. A competition in which a team of 13, this year headed up by me, take part in a series of activities, including a drill test, shooting, an RAF knowledge test and aircraft recognition test. This is one of the most prestigious events in the CCF calendar.

One of the most highly commended courses in the RAF Air Cadets is the Air Cadet Leadership Course which takes place over a week at the home of Initial Officer Training, RAF Cranwell. Many leadership skills are developed on exercises, culminating with a parade of College Hall Officers Mess. It is the only course apart from Initial Officer Training to parade on that parade ground and is also in front of friends and family. It is one of the proudest days as you get the sense of achievement having completed one of the most physically and mentally challenging courses that you will undertake as a cadet.

Range days take place throughout the year on some short 25m ranges and also on longer 200-300m ranges, enabling more qualifications and awards to be attained in your time with the CCF.

Flying is what everyone 'joins us for' and is ultimately one of the main perks of CCF with many chances to go flying at RAF Cranwell and take control of aircraft for a majority of the Air Experience Flight.

Another highlight is Remembrance Day. The school and town parades are two very solemn occasions when we look back and remember with pride that "never has so much been owed to so few by so many", with many Old Boys of our school remembered as well as national and international men and women.

We also help in the local community with the Royal British Legion Poppy appeal and have recently helped with a Woodland Trust project to plant many hundreds of trees over the past 4 years to celebrate the centenary of WW1.

Camping is also a really big aspect of the CCF, with summer camps, camps in school holidays, camps over weekends and exercises all through the year, just another life skill in putting up a tent and encouraging more time to be spent outdoors without consciously thinking about it.

The CCF has really helped me and set me up to join the RAF as I have been awarded a flying scholarship and take a step towards a long-term ambition of being an RAF pilot with one of the ISTAR (Intelligence, Surveillance Target Acquisition and Reconnaissance) squadrons.

If you want an all-round extra-curricular activity at King's then the RAF Section is certainly an activity you should consider, take up and embrace every opportunity.



SGT. JACK TAYLOR

I am writing to give you an understanding of why I joined the CCF, my personal views, what I've learnt, my unique experiences and, finally, where the CCF as a whole will take me next.

I first decided to join the CCF in Year 9 just after the rugby season had finished. I was eager to get my uniform and attend my first Thursday night parade. I joined to have some fun with my friends, to be adventurous and do things that I wouldn't be able to do in normal school life. I also saw the CCF as a

taster for military life, a career I'd hope to take in the future. Besides, which Year 9 boy wouldn't want the opportunity to roll around in the mud and effectively play 'toy soldiers'?

I am a big fan of drill as I enjoy discipline and improving my communication skills. Another of my favourite activities is live firing which all army cadets get the opportunity to do. This is one of the most adrenaline-pumping tasks a cadet will get to do and one event that would be able to be ticked off from their life bucket list. However, my absolute favourite CCF activity is blank firing during scenarios and simulated war scenes where a long chain of command comes together to work effectively in the field.

The CCF has taught me many different things as well as changing my attitude to many aspects of everyday life. I think I have become a much more disciplined character that respects the CCF and school hierarchy. I have also become more organised, especially with timings. As they say in the Army, 5 minutes early is on time! The most important skill that I have gained is dealing and being comfortable with responsibility. Everyone has to take responsibility in life, whether it's being a senior NCO or a manager of a business.

Before Christmas I was given the opportunity to go on the Senior Cadet Instructors Course (SCIC) with two fellow Army cadets. This one-week course, based at Beckingham, aimed to get regular corporals and teach them all the different elements of teaching as a whole. SCIC also included teaching in the field, complex night navigation exercises and constant lessons needing to be prepared and practiced, ready for assessment the following day. Overall, I found the course difficult, mainly mentally, not physically, but despite these challenges I still received the top award of 'Highly Competent' at the end of my week. These teaching skills have assisted me not only in the CCF but also for my presentation skills in English lessons.

I am to continue attending camps and exercises so that I can pass on my knowledge to other younger cadets and to carry on leading groups of cadets as a senior NCO. A personal goal of mine would be to improve my shooting skills on the range which can easily be done by attending the Friday after-school shooting club (see extra-curricular activities calendar).

Finally, my main goal is to sign up with the armed forces after Sixth Form or to attend university where I can specialise in medicine. The CCF will continue to help me get there. If you are looking for an action-packed adventure at The King's School, then the Army Section is the activity for you. I hope to see you soon!

Dr Daniels gained A Levels in Maths, Further Maths, Chemistry and Physics from Loughborough High School. She attended Bristol University Medical School and qualified as a doctor in 1994. She completed her basic training in the South West and then worked as an anaesthetist. During her intensive care rotation, realising she preferred general medicine to anaesthetics, she completed her training in General Internal Medicine. Dr Daniels has done 3 years of research into MRI scanning in Carotid Artery Stenosis in the Neurosciences Department of the University of Nottingham. In 2008 she qualified as a consultant and is now Head of Service for Acute Medicine, Frailty and Ambulatory at Lincoln County Hospital and is the Chair of the Lincolnshire Frailty Expert Reference Group.
