GCSE NATIONAL PERFORMANCE TABLES - RELEASED 18 OCTOBER

The summer of 2018 saw some of the highest performance in the GCSE national L examinations.

The school was concerned about the new 9-1 grading system and how our students would fare in the new, much more complex, examinations. However, the students rose to the challenge and achieved some amazing results.

There are now 5 key national 'Headline Measures' for schools and below is how we performed against them:

Progress 8 - 0.54 [This will place King's in the top 10% of schools nationally].

The Average Attainment 8 score per pupil of 68.3, nationally this was 44.3 and in Lincolnshire 46.4.

The King's School entered 64% of students for the full English Baccalaureate suit of subjects which compares to the national average of 35%.

The average point score for the full English Baccalaureate was 6.45 (0.55 off an old A - 7).

Mathematics, The King's School students achieved 93% against a national statistic of less than 40%.

Attainment 8 is calculated by adding the best scores from English and mathematics, doubling them. Then adding the three best scores from any: Science, languages or humanities subjects. Then adding the best three remaining scores. Progress 8 compares all schools' attainment 8 scores for all of the students. These are individually compared to the Key Stage 2 results. The Department for Education then calculates a progress grade for each school, so that 0.00 is the national average. Our score of 0.54 equates to half a grade better in every GCSE taken than students achieved from the same starting Key Stage 2 nationally.

n Thursday 27 September pupils from 6 secondary schools in Grantham came together at Christchurch in Finkin Street for the Big Science Breakthrough Show. The evening was presented by Television Celebrity Dallas Campbell.

Each school created a team to present a great scientific breakthrough in a novel and inspiring format. The range of presentations was stunning and each focused on a different amazing breakthrough of science past, present and future.

In an X factor style event our students performed incredibly creating a cooking show to explain the Miller-Urey experiments findings on 'Primeval Soup'.

MOON LANDING

The moon landed at St Wulfram's Church and on **L** Thursday 27 September Form 7B had an exciting visit to the Museum of the Moon during their science lesson. The enormous spectacle not only filled the church but filled the boys with awe and wonder as they had this opportunity.

Museum of the Moon is a touring artwork by UK artist Luke Jerram. Measuring seven metres in diameter, the moon features detailed NASA imagery of the lunar surface. At an approximate scale of 1:500,000, each centimetre of the internally lit spherical sculpture represents 5km of the moon's surface.

It was a real privilege to see the installation which is a fusion of lunar imagery, moonlight and surround sound composition created by BAFTA and Ivor Novello award winning composer Dan Jones. Each venue also programmed their own series lunar inspired events beneath the moon. They were impressed with the detail and the illumination.

Science on the Wild Side

During Gravity Fields Year 10 visited the Science exhibition at the Alive Church in their physics lessons. They observed gravitational fields in a planetarium with Birmingham University, local wildlife with the Lincolnshire Wildlife Trust, the modelling of invisible particles with Durham University as well as demonstration of chromatography and Lens's law with Grantham College. Alongside this some students took part in scientific glass blowing and enjoyed learning about the difficulties of this art.

Our Samba celebration was joined by 100 professional dancers to portray the arrival of the explorer Joseph Banks to 'The New World'.

SPORTING EXCELLENCE

The First XV endured a difficult start to the season, L losing their opening game at Worksop College. However, since then, the 1st and 2nd XV and U-16 teams have been undefeated with excellent wins against Priory, Oakham and Carre's.

The First XV have been successful in reaching the 4th round of the Natwest U-18 Vase, overcoming King's School Peterborough 58-7 in the 3rd round. They are also undefeated in the U18 County League competition. The team has fostered a fantastic team spirit with over 40 boys from Years 11-13 regularly attending training. If this continues, the boys hope to be rewarded with some silverware at the end of the season.

The large numbers at training and the winning trend continues down the school with the fields swarming with boys every day after school. Year 7 started the season well with the A and B teams winning against Wisbech. Year 8 have enjoyed a particularly good year, remaining undefeated The Autumn Term has seen all our age groups in action across the region with 29 matches played overall.

Year 9 are also undefeated this season and have won the NLD 12-a-side competition against some tough opposition.

It was a glorious morning on the school's playing field where Year 9 and Year 10 kicked off the tournament in a competitive and thrilling nature which saw More House (Year 9) and School House (Year 10) come out victorious.

In the second session the Year 7s were participating in their first House event of the year and despite some very close games, it was Foxe House who finished first in the league. The Year 8 competition was dominated by School House who managed to go unbeaten in all five of their games.

Vear 11 student George Park achieved the huge accolade of performing in the **I** premier cricket competition in the country, the Bunbury Festival. The U15 Bunbury festival takes place in August each year and features boys representing 4 regions; the North, the Midlands, the South and West and London and the East. All the boys went through a long process of scouting, trials and trial matches that began in February with the final 14 squad being selected in late July. The 33rd festival was held at Millfield School in 2018, shortly after arriving on the Sunday evening all the boys are presented with their caps by former England opener Marcus Trescothick. 50-over matches were played on the Monday, Tuesday and Thursday the boys play, with Wednesdays and Fridays dedicated to T20 games.

The Midlands squad was selected from players who represent their counties at U15 level and includes Lincolnshire, Leicestershire, Derbyshire, Nottinghamshire, Worcestershire, Warwickshire, Northants, Staffordshire, Shropshire and Herefordshire (the biggest number of counties within any of the four regions). The selection process involved indoor sessions at the Centre of Excellence at Loughborough and trial games at Denstone College, Sifnal CC, and Denby CC as well as feedback given by each county coach. There were originally 40 boys trialling although over the months some came in some went out and others came back in as the number was whittled down to 14.
