HEAD MASTER'S PAGE

Dear Parent/Carer,

SAFEGUARDING

I am increasingly concerned about a number of issues which, if not addressed promptly, have the potential to affect the safety of your son. Although the issues are wide-ranging, I would be grateful if you would take the time to talk to your son about each of them.

Crossing roads safely

I have received several emails and phone calls from members of the local community expressing concern about the way a number of boys are crossing the road on their way to and from school. In addition, several boys have been seen crossing the road wearing headphones, apparently oblivious to danger.

Would you please impress upon your son the need to:

- Cross the road at the nearest pedestrian crossing once the lights have turned red and the traffic has stopped.
 He should not cut across the road between cars.
- Remove headphones and stop using his mobile phone when he is about to cross a road so that he can fully concentrate on crossing without any distraction.

Students riding bicycles

Please remind your son that he <u>must</u> wear a safety helmet whilst he is riding his bike. Once he enters the school site, he must dismount and walk to the cycle shed. At the end of the day he must walk up the drive and not mount his bike until he is on the public road.

Visitor car park

Though I am grateful to those parents who have stopped using the car park at the front of the school, may I remind you that cars moving in this area present a real danger to the boys. With immediate effect I ask that all parents drop their son in the vicinity of the school but do not enter the school site. There are local car parks within easy walking distance where boys can be collected.

Students waiting for buses at the end of the day

Boys waiting for buses must remain on the school site in the visitor's car park where they can be supervised by staff. No boy should leave the site to visit local shops and then return in order to catch a bus.

Students collected by taxi at the end of the day

Following a visit from an inspector for Lincolnshire County Council road safety we are in the process of introducing new arrangements for the collection of boys at the end of the day. The Local Authority will inform parents of the changes once they have been finalised.

Sixth Form cars

I have received a number of complaints from local residents about inconsiderate parking and the behavior of a small number of senior boys. Mr Barton and I have spoken to the boys and we would appreciate your continued support to encourage the boys to park considerately away from the school site.

Your support in helping to create a safe environment for the boys is greatly appreciated.

We subscribe to the entertaining learning platform, Linguascope, which students can use at school and at home once they have obtained the passwords from a member of staff in the Department.

We are pleased to announce that 12 students in Years 9 and 10 have successfully completed a pre-GCSE qualification in Latin, a two -year course run by Mr Finke for a number of years. It is hoped that many of these students will now join us for the Year 11 Enrichment Course in French and German this term.

Rugby Report

The Autumn term has seen all our age groups in action across the region with 30 matches played overall.

The first match of the season saw King's enjoy a clean sweep for all years against Nottingham High School with our 1st XV winning 46-0.



Since then the competition grew exponentially for our seniors who progressed easily through Round 1 of the National NatWest U18 Vase competition only to meet last year's National Champions, Trent College, in Round 2 where they lost 33-15. However, the first team have

induced a fantastic squad ethos which has resulted in 40+ boys from Years 11-13 training and competing for first and second team places and, underpinning the squad, the 2nd XV remain unbeaten so far this season with plenty of tough matches still to be played up to Christmas.

The winning trend continues lower down the school with Years 7, 8 and 9 also remaining unbeaten running into half-term, having dispatched Oakham, Hill House, Carres, Priory and Worksop College. Year 7 in particular look a strong year and we are enjoying fantastic turn-outs at training on Thursdays with almost 50 boys regularly attending.

Our talented Year 10s are progressing well in the National U15 Vase competition having narrowly lost to Uppingham in the Top Tier Cup in what was a thrilling match. Our boys were 25-0 down at half-time yet finished the match an agonizing 29-25 with a couple of match-winning chances going amiss. They showed tremendous grit to drag the match back and hopefully can now carry that belief onwards in the Vase.


